



MCHCCN Data/Coordinated Entry Presentation

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Household Types Captured (10/1/23-9/30/24)

- Family Household's make up approximately 17% of all Households captured
 - Average age of a child experiencing homelessness within a family household is 6 years old.
- Single Households make up approximately 84% of households captured.
 - Average age of an adult experiencing homelessness is 43 years old.
- Youth (18-24) Only Households make up approximately 8%*
 - *Youth Only Households are a sub-set of the Adult Only households.

Coordinated Entry Data-Total Serve

- Total Households Served -519 Households
- Of the 519 Household served:
 - Single households make up 67%
 - Family Households make up 33.5%
- 53 % of people were Housed



Permanent Supportive Housing (10/1/23-9/30/24)

- 92% of Permanent Supportive Housing families and singles remained housed!



Clients Who Exit Homelessness to Permanent Housing Destinations Return to Homelessness within 6,12,24 months:

- Of all clients captured(185 clients)-
 - 9.8% of clients were returning to homelessness within 6 months.
 - 6.3% in 6-12 months
 - 7.5% in 1-2 years
 - Overall recidivism rate sits at 21.28% which align closely with Michigan as a whole.
- Family Households make up .5% of those who returned to homelessness within 6 months.
- Single Households make up 9.2% of those who return within 6 months.

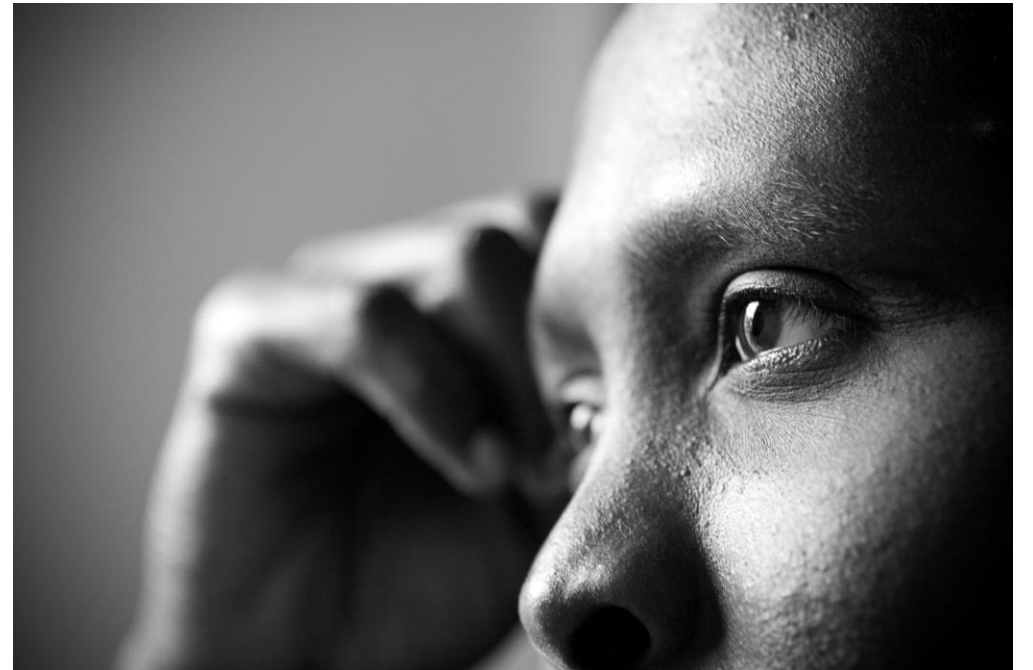
First Time Homelessness & Length of Time Clients Remain Homeless (Emergency shelter only):

- Of the 460 persons with entries in ES, 363 people are experiencing homelessness for the first time with no prior enrollment in the past 24 months.
- Average Length of Stay is approximately 53.9 days in shelter.
- Single Households spend an average of 54 days in shelter.
- Family Households spend an average of 53 days in shelter
- DEI Finding-
 - White Family households stayed in emergency shelter less often than Black Family households, but their stays were longer on average—65 days compared to 55 days for Black households.

Emergency Shelter Outcomes (10/1/23-9/30/24) :

- 647 Clients
- 458 Households

- 50 clients (duplicated) exited to permanent housing destinations.



2024 Point in Time Count:

- The CoC implemented new techniques for the 2024 PIT count. The CoC utilized the HUD Authorized 7-day window after the night of PIT to continue collecting data. Service Based Volunteers were posted at high traffic organizations and they were able to collect additional data on individuals who were homeless night of PIT but were not found.
- The HMIS Administrator worked closely with Every Woman's Place to collect disaggregated data on clients in Transitional Housing and those who were in shelter on the night of PIT.

DEI Findings Information:

- Returns to Homelessness: Black, African American, or African clients make up 51.9% of the overall populations exiting to permanent destinations.
- They also make up 5.4% of t
- Black, African American, or African clients make up 44% of the population that stayed in an Emergency shelter. On average, they stayed in shelter for approximately 54 days.
- Hispanic/Latina/e/o clients spend an average of 44 days in shelter.
- Veteran Clients, as a whole, spend on average about 66 days in shelter.

CoC Reporting:

- LSA: Reporting Period 10/01/23-9/30/2024 - In the beginning of 2024, the CoC worked to complete the Longitudinal System Analysis, which initially included 14 warning flags found. This was eventually brought down to 11 warning flags. In the end, the CoC managed to generate 9 out of 11 flags were marked to be a sufficient representation of the community. In all, this was a two-month process.
- SPM: Reporting Period 10/01/23-9/30/2024 - Contains 6 Performance Measures which are tracked and utilized as an element in the CoC Program Competition and gauge the state of the homeless response system nationally. Each year the CoC presents the findings from this reporting with a comparison of the previous year to determine what is and isn't working in the homeless response system
- HIC/PIT-Annually, the CoC performs the Point-in-Time count where then information related to the PIT count is entered into HMIS. Then, reports are generated and uploaded into HDX 2.0 for the Annual Homeless Assessment Report which is published by HUD. Housing Inventory Count is also reviewed to ensure accuracy and that it aligns with the PIT count as well to determine how many beds were potentially available on the night of the PIT.
